tenses of present, past, and future, the

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English language allows us to make three statements about accomplished facts. We use one of the three perfect tenses to show an action that has taken place as of the present time or is continuing in the present time (present-perfect tense), that had taken place as of a past time (past-perfect tense), or that will have taken place as of a future time (future-perfect tense).

Future Tense. Future tense expresses an action or situation that will occur in the future. This tense is formed by using will/shall with the simple form of the verb.. The speaker of the House will finish her term in May of 1998.. The future tense can also be expressed by using am, is, or are with going to.. The surgeon is going to perform the first bypass in Minnesota.

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quantities. For the sake of simplicity, Learners of English as a Foreign or Second Language are usually taught that - taking into account aspect and future modals - there are 12 tenses in English.

Grammar. Verbs come in three tenses: past, present, and future. The past is used to describe things that have already happened (e.g., earlier in the day, yesterday, last week, three years ago). The present tense is used to describe things that are happening right now, or things that are continuous. The future tense describes things that have yet to happen (e.g., later, tomorrow, next week, next year, three years from now).
