Here the midwife is woman-centred, focuses on the mother-baby relationship and uses a 'hands-off' approach during breastfeeding support. Most midwives seem to naturally favour the hands-off role of being a skilled companion but working in a busy hospital setting doesn't always support this, leaving most limited to the role of technical expert (Swerts et al. 2016).

Since breastfeeding is helpful to promote babies' health and is generally considered as a professional issue, mothers require professional support for appropriate breastfeeding (Riordan, 2005). One of the primary responsibilities of nurses/midwives is to promote the health of babies (Riordan, 2005).

Midwives' support of breastfeeding in maternity wards has been proven to provide an impact on women's breastfeeding experiences. In previous studies women describe professional support unfavourably, with an emphasis on time pressures, lack of availability or guidance, promotion of unhelpful practices, and conflicting advice.

Two sides of breastfeeding support: experiences of women ...

Generally, the production of breastmilk is a priority, for both the midwives and the mothers. Overall a hands-on approach regarding breastfeeding support was observed, mainly in the hospital settings when compared with the findings from the primary healthcare settings. A hands-on approach often occurs without asking the mother's consent.

The supporting role of the midwife during the first 14 ...

Despite national breastfeeding standards and policies within maternity units in the UK, the benefit is not being felt by mothers because midwives and MSWs lack time and resources to adequately implement them. Surprisingly, nearly one fifth of midwives surveyed reported that breastfeeding was not usually initiated within the first hour.

Midwives generally provide reproductive education in fertility, nutrition, exercise, contraception, pregnancy health, breastfeeding, and quality infant care. Women in midwifery care have better breastfeeding rates than the provincial average (91% vs 59%). The attentive postpartum care you receive from your midwife in the early days, when breastfeeding is being established, makes it easier for your midwife to spot any breastfeeding issues early before it becomes a bigger problem.

CONCLUSIONS: Caring for new mothers with initial breastfeeding difficulties is a balancing act between the midwife's personal desire to succeed in enabling mothers to breastfeed, the mothers' wishes, the infants' needs, the importance of collective collegial competence and the limitations in the health care organisation.
